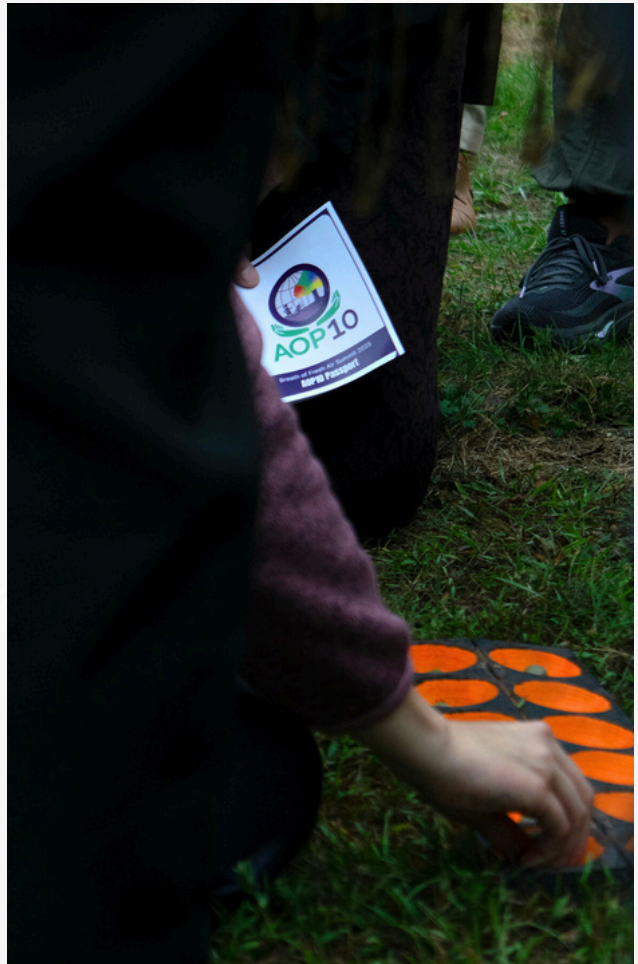

Message from the President

Outdoor Play Canada (OPC) continues to grow, build new connections, and have demonstrable impact!

Our biggest celebration this year was the launch of the 2025 global Position Statement on Active Outdoor Play at our biennial Breath of Fresh Air Outdoor Play Summit in Ottawa in September. That Position Statement served as a major update to the 2015 Position Statement, by being global in scope and inclusive of all ages, while exploring the benefits of active outdoor play for people (of all ages, cultures and abilities), communities, environments, and the planet.

The 2025 Breath of Fresh Air Summit was another major celebration, this time bringing together over 300 people from across Canada and the world to help launch the Position Statement, showcase the work of outdoor play researchers, practitioners, and policymakers; participate in global outdoor play games; and connect over evening campfires.

The Canadian Centre for Outdoor Play (CCOP) is now well-established and running smoothly. Over the past year, Andrew Fleck Children's Services childcare program has seen the transformation of their outdoor learning spaces to meet the needs and dreams of educators and children alike; Healthy Active Living and Obesity (HALO)'s research program is now well-underway, with >100 children and families participating; the first cohort of Algonquin College's Play, Learn, and Teach Outdoors certificate program graduated at the end of 2025; all with OPC working hard to coordinate, celebrate, and share out the work across this collaboration.

New this year is our CCOP Annual Report (hopefully this helps colleagues distinguish between OPC and the CCOP) – we invite you to check it out!

And finally, our work exploring how to support children living with a disability and their families in outdoor play and learning in natural spaces is also well-underway. As part of that work we created several videos and tip sheets to support educators, parents, and caregivers in addressing common barriers to bringing learning and play outdoors for children with disabilities. As that work progresses, be sure to check out our website for the latest updates and resources.

OPC is honoured to have outstanding, dedicated, committed, and passionate staff, students, and volunteers who make everything happen – to them we are grateful and say thank you. But there's so much more to share! Please enjoy digging into OPC's 2025 Annual Report and accept our best wishes for a healthy, happy, and outdoor play-filled 2026!

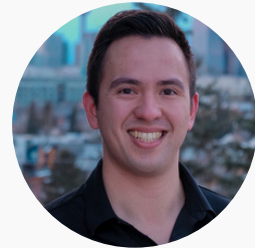

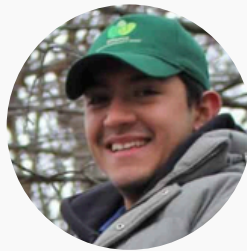

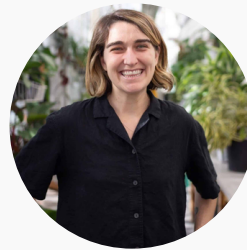

The CCOP leads demonstration projects, informs policy and practice, provides professional development opportunities, conducts applied research, and leads nationwide knowledge translation and mobilization efforts to advance outdoor play and learning for the health and well-being of children of all abilities in Canada. At its foundation is the Forest Explorers outdoor and nature-based early childhood education program, located on 500 acres of National Capital Commission land in the west end of Ottawa, Ontario.

The CCOP is a collaboration between Outdoor Play Canada, the Healthy Active Living and Obesity Research Group at the CHEO Research Institute, University of Ottawa, the University of Toronto, Algonquin College, and Andrew Fleck Children's Services.

Updates from the Canadian Centre for Outdoor Play (CCOP)

1 THE FOREST EXPLORERS PROGRAM



In 2025, the Forest Explorers program continued to provide high-quality outdoor-focused ECE programming. The program supported 111 children and 40 educators across infant, toddler, and preschool ages, offering consistent child-led, inquiry-based learning that fosters children's curiosity, autonomy, and well-being. These experiences were supported by the intentionally designed environment

and flexible routines that reflect seasonal changes and the interests of the children. Throughout 2025, Forest Explorers strengthened its connections with families and community partners and supported ongoing outdoor-focused professional learning for educators, reinforcing its commitment to inclusive, reflective, and Land-based early learning practice.



CELEBRATING THE ONE YEAR ANNIVERSARY OF THE FOREST EXPLORERS PROGRAM



On June 26th, the CCOP hosted its second Open House to celebrate one year of the Forest Explorers licensed outdoor early learning program and the CCOP at Wesley Clover Parks. THE OUTDOOR GEAR LIBRARY 2

Outdoor gear remains a significant barrier to year-round outdoor play and learning. In response, CCOP established an outdoor gear library with support from the Waltons Trust, the Ottawa Community Foundation, and the Public Health Agency of Canada.

This initiative ensures that all children attending Forest Explorers have access to appropriate gear across seasons.

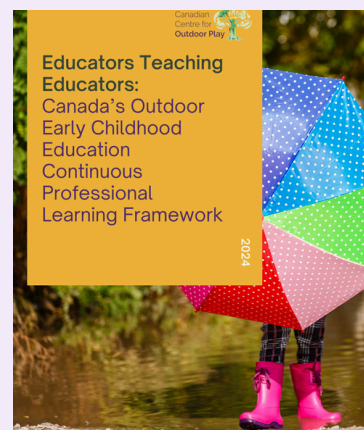
In 2025, the library expanded to better support educators as well, through discounted equipment secured via Outdoor ProLink and a new partnership with Patagonia Ottawa through the 1% for the Planet community, which provided rain gear for all educators. [Read more here.](#)

3 THE PLaTO CERTIFICATE

In 2025, Algonquin College continued to deliver and advance the Play, Learn, and Teach Outdoors in the Early Years (PLaTO) certificate, building on the program's launch in 2024. Grounded in [the Outdoor ECE Framework](#), the PLaTO certificate supports the growth of a national community of practitioners committed to high-quality outdoor play and learning in the early years.

This year, the PLaTO certificate celebrated its first graduating cohort of 10 students. In 2026, the next cohort is being planned for May 2026, with efforts being made to continuously explore how to support outdoor play and learning for children of all abilities as part of the certificate.

THE CCOP NATIONAL PANEL ON REGULATING OUTDOOR AND LAND-BASED ECE



In 2025, the CCOP continued advancing the work of the National Panel on Regulating Outdoor and Land-Based Early Childhood Education. In September, the Panel convened a world café style gathering as part of the 2025 Breath of Fresh Air Outdoor Play Summit. The participatory session was structured around the Panel's four subcommittees

— professional development; quality of outdoor learning and spaces; justice, equity, diversity, inclusion, and access; and licensing and regulations — and brought together practitioners, policymakers, researchers, and advocates to engage in open dialogue on the future of regulating and licensing outdoor and Land-based ECE across Canada.

Insights from this gathering are informing the Panel's continued policy, systems, and sector-level advocacy, as well as forthcoming resources and outputs to support regulations change across provinces and territories.

CCOP COMMUNITY OF PRACTICE

The CCOP continues to cultivate a national Community of Practice (CoP) focused on outdoor early childhood education, bringing together more than 60 educators from across Canada. Updates from the Canadian Centre for Outdoor Play (CCOP) – SPROUT and SPROUT-Able Projects

6 THE SPROUT AND SPROUT-ABLE STUDY

The SPROUT (Sending PReschoolers OUTside) Study is a three-year research initiative launched by the Healthy Active Living and Obesity (HALO) Research Group, and co-led with the University of Ottawa. This study is a longitudinal comparative study that explores the health, wellbeing, and experiences of children, educators, and families participating in AFCS' full-day licensed outdoor-focused ECE program (Forest Explorers), in comparison to conventional childcare programs in the city of Ottawa.

With 78 children and their families and 27 educators enrolled (and counting!) in 2025, the SPROUT study examines:

- Parents' beliefs and attitudes toward outdoor play and learning in nature-based vs. traditional childcare settings.
- Early childhood educators' job satisfaction, health, and wellbeing, as well as their perspectives on teaching in outdoor environments for children of all abilities.
- Children's health and development, evaluating the impact of full-day outdoor-focused ECE on young children aged 10-59 months.

The SPROUT-able Project is an extension of the SPROUT study in partnership with the Canadian Disability Participation Project 2.0 (CDPP 2.0) and the University of Toronto. SPROUTable expands upon the SPROUT Study by investigating how children with disabilities engage in outdoor play and learning in natural spaces.

Partnerships

OPC **served (and continues to serve)** as a community partner on the Canadian Disability Participation Project 2.0 (CDPP 2.0) led by Dr. Amy Latimer-Cheung out of Queen's University. This 7-year grant funded by the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council supports several working groups dedicated to promoting quality participation in physical activity, including active play in the early years. OPC is the lead organization of the Active Play in the Early Years working group.

OPC **is a member of** the 1% for the Planet community as an environmental partner.



OPC **formed** a new partnership to launch the Rock the Wild concert in Ottawa! This benefit concert featuring Juno Award winning musician TALK raised over \$20,000 for local Forest and Nature Schools in the Ottawa and Gatineau region.

The 2025 Position Statement on Active Outdoor Play serves as a celebration and extension of [the 2015 Position Statement](#) by being global in scope and inclusive of all ages, while exploring the benefits of active outdoor play for people (of all ages, cultures and abilities), communities, environments, and the planet. This initiative has been an extensive and intensive three-year process, involving an international Leadership Group consisting of researchers and thought leaders from every inhabited continent, alongside a larger Steering Committee consisting of over 130 researchers, practitioners, policymakers, and other active outdoor play-relevant actors and groups.

Outdoor Play Canada held yet another successful Breath of Fresh Air Outdoor Play Summit! With record numbers this year, delegates attended talks from over 50 speakers across three days in the beautiful Wesley Clover Parks Campground. Here are some highlights from the summit!



Over three days, **264 participants (and over 300 for the AOP10 launch!)** gathered for a dynamic program featuring **52 speakers** across **6 symposiums, 16 presentations, and 13 workshops**. The Summit also welcomed **15 poster presenters, 17 booth hosts**, and a featured keynote address, highlighting the multi-faceted importance of outdoor play for health and wellbeing.

Launch of the 2025 Position Statement on Active Outdoor Play

The opening day of the 2025 Breath of Fresh Air (BoFA) Outdoor Play Summit marked the official launch of the Global Position Statement on Active Outdoor Play, unveiled in front of over 300 attendees from across Canada and beyond. Developed over three years with input from more than 200 global experts, the Position Statement underscores the importance of active outdoor play not only for children, but across the lifespan, including its relevance for human and environmental health, learning, and community connection. The launch served as a cornerstone moment for the Summit, anchoring discussions that followed.



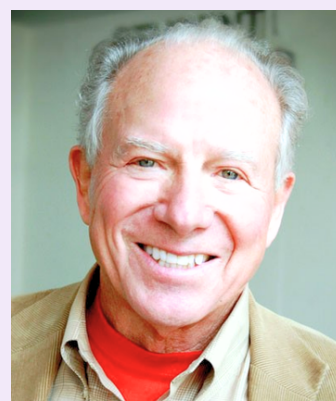

Mentorship

Mentorship

She led the knowledge translation and mobilization (KTM) element of the 2025 Position Statement on Active Play (AOP10) project. As part of the CCOP, OPC mentored three students in their projects as part of the Bachelor's of Early Learning and Community Development at Algonquin College.



Amanda Lenz completed her third-year placement for her community-based practicum at the Canadian Centre for Outdoor Play. As part of her placement, she worked on creating a report for the National Panel on Regulating Outdoor and Land-based ECE, supporting the collection of resources on applying a multi-lens approach to outdoor play and learning for the Outdoor ECE Framework, and wrote a blog post about the CCOP gear library.



Darcie Clement completed a summer 2025 placement with the CCOP as the SPROUT-able project assistant. Her work included launching the SPROUT-able library at Forest Explorers and developing and rolling out Supporting Inclusion Through Puppets, a toolkit for educators to facilitate inclusion and support for children's varying needs through the use of puppets.

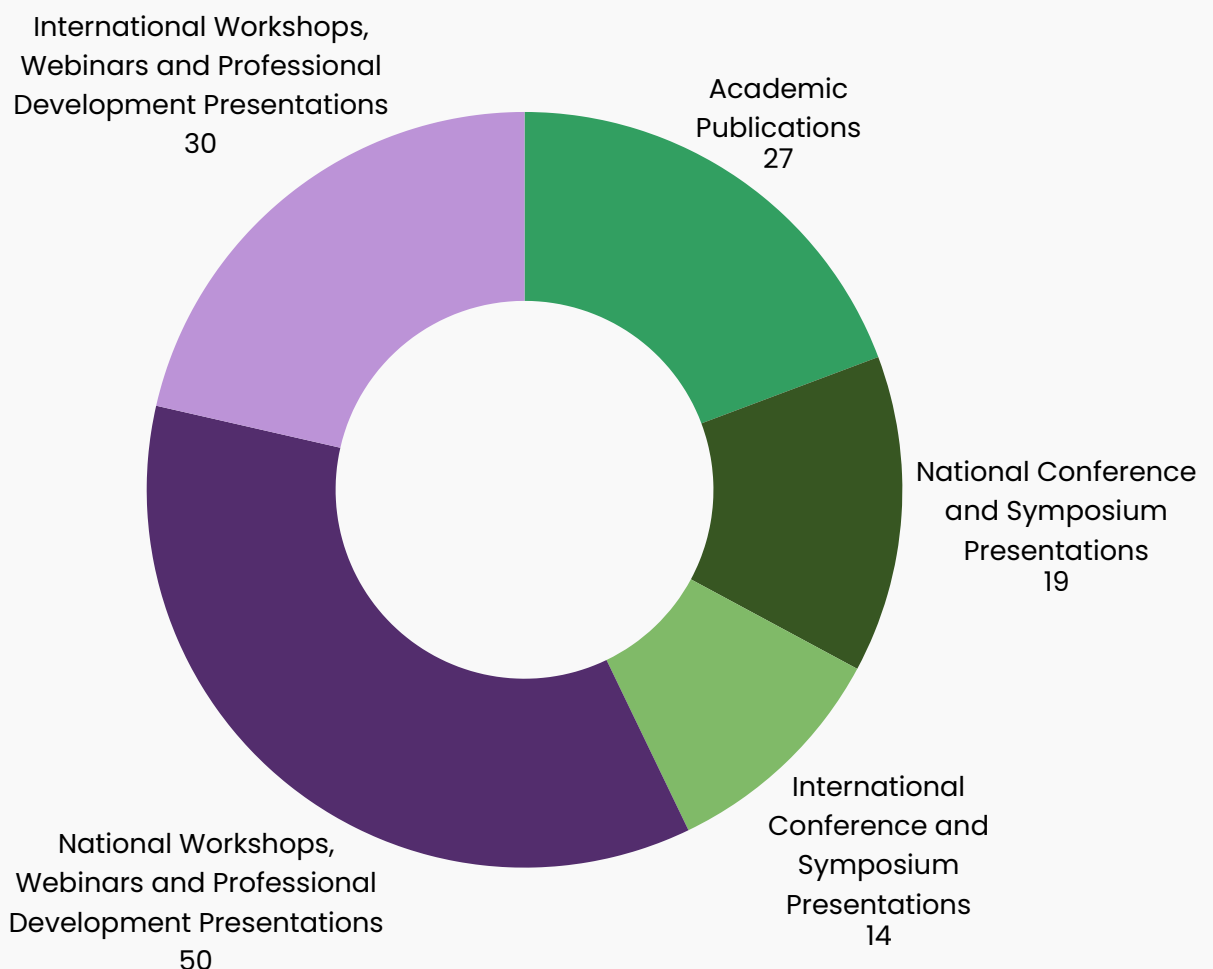

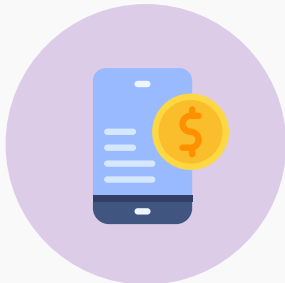
