We're excited to announce the launch of [the Canadian Centre for Outdoor Play Champions Program](#): a new initiative celebrating educators who demonstrate leadership in outdoor and land-based play and learning across Canada!

Launching for the first time this year, the program recognizes educators whose work reflects the Three Rooted Principles of Active Engagement, Holistic Development, and Meaningful Connections, based on [the Outdoor Early Childhood Education Continuous Professional Learning Framework](#), and who champion inclusive, relational approaches to outdoor play.

Selected Champions will be celebrated nationally and supported through visibility, resources, mentorship, and leadership opportunities within the CCOP network.

Also, spending less time outside usually means engaging in less physical activity, where physical activity is important for maintaining a healthy immune system. 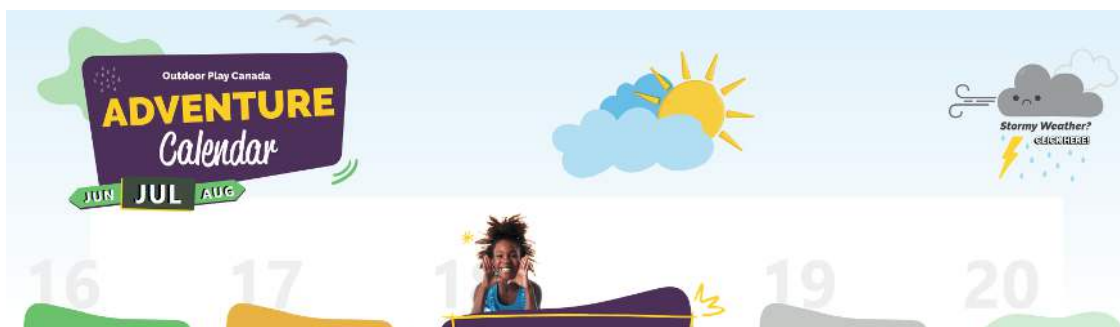
